We have audited the consolidated financial statements of the Batavia Development Corporation and its wholly owned subsidiary Creek Park Batavia LLC (collectively referred to as the "Corporation"), as of and for the years ended March 31, 2026 and 2025, and have issued our report thereon dated June 17, 2026 (which report includes an emphasis of matter paragraph regarding a restatement of net position for the correction of an error). Professional standards require that we advise you of the following matters relating to our audit.

Our Responsibility in Relation to the Financial Statement Audit

As communicated in our engagement letter dated May 27, 2026, our responsibility, as described by professional standards, is to form and express an opinion about whether the consolidated financial statements that have been prepared by management with your oversight are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our audit of the consolidated financial statements does not relieve you or management of your respective responsibilities.

Our responsibility, as prescribed by professional standards, is to plan and perform our audits to obtain reasonable, rather than absolute, assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit of financial statements includes consideration of the system of internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, as part of our audit, we considered the system of internal control of the Corporation solely for the purpose of determining our audit procedures and not to provide any assurance concerning such internal control.

We are also responsible for communicating significant matters related to the audit that are, in our professional judgment, relevant to your responsibilities in overseeing the financial reporting process. However, we are not required to design procedures for the purpose of identifying other matters to communicate to you.

Planned Scope and Timing of the Audit

We conducted our audit consistent with the planned scope and timing we previously communicated to you.

Compliance with All Ethics Requirements Regarding Independence

The engagement team, others in our firm, as appropriate; and our firm have complied with all relevant ethical requirements regarding independence.

Qualitative Aspects of the Entity's Significant Accounting Practices

Significant Accounting Policies

Management has the responsibility to select and use appropriate accounting policies. A summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the Corporation is included in Note 1 to the consolidated financial statements. There have been no initial selection of accounting policies and no changes in significant accounting policies or their application during the year ended March 31, 2026.

During the year ended March 31, 2026, the Corporation implemented Government Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") Statement No. 102, *Certain Risk Disclosures*. GASB Statement No. 102 provides users with timely information regarding certain concentrations or constraints and related events that have occurred or have begun to occur that make a government vulnerable to a substantial impact. The implementation of GASB Statement No. 102 did not have a material impact on Corporation's financial position or results from operations.

During the year ended March 31, 2026, the Corporation corrected a prior year error. As a result, net position was restated by \$(10,970) as of April 1, 2025 and \$(5,497) as of April 1, 2024.

No matters have come to our attention that would require us, under professional standards, to inform you about (1) the methods used to account for significant unusual transactions and (2) the effect of significant accounting policies in controversial or emerging areas for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Significant Accounting Estimates and Related Disclosures

Accounting estimates and related disclosures are an integral part of the consolidated financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's current judgments. Those judgments are normally based on knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the consolidated financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ markedly from management's current judgments.

The Corporation's compensated absences liability is a significant estimate for the years ended March 31, 2026 and March 31, 2025.

Financial Statement Disclosures

Certain financial statement disclosures involve significant judgment and are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. The most sensitive disclosures affecting the Corporation's financial statements relate to significant accounting policies and disclosures relating to contingencies as described in Notes 1 and 7 to the financial statements.

Significant Unusual Transactions

For purposes of this communication, professional standards require us to communicate to you significant unusual transactions identified during our audit. We encountered no significant unusual transactions throughout our audit.

Significant Difficulties Encountered during the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management relating to the performance of the audit.

Uncorrected and Corrected Misstatements

For purposes of this communication, professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that we believe are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Further, professional standards require us to also communicate the effect of uncorrected misstatements related to prior periods on the relevant classes of transactions, account balances or disclosures, and the consolidated financial statements as a whole. Management has corrected all identified material misstatements.

In addition, professional standards require us to communicate to you all material, corrected misstatements that were brought to the attention of management as a result of our audit procedures. Material misstatements that were identified as a result of our audit procedures were brought to the attention of, and corrected by, management. Those items are included within the proposed adjusting journal entries for the year ended March 31, 2026, which are attached to the management representation letter dated June 17, 2026 as Exhibit I (copy attached).

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, professional standards define a disagreement with management as a matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, concerning a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, which could be significant to the Corporation's financial statements or the auditor's report. No such disagreements arose during the course of the audit.

Representations Requested from Management

We have requested certain written representations from management, which are included in the attached letter dated June 17, 2026.

Management's Consultations with Other Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters. Management informed us that, and to our knowledge, there were no consultations with other accountants regarding auditing and accounting matters.

Other Significant Matters, Findings or Issues

In the normal course of our professional association with the Corporation, we generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, significant events or transactions that occurred during the year, operating and regulatory conditions affecting the entity, and operational plans and strategies that may affect the risks of material misstatement. None of the matters discussed resulted in a condition to our retention as the Corporation's auditors.

This representation letter is provided in connection with your audit of the consolidated financial statements of the Batavia Development Corporation and its wholly owned subsidiary, Creek Park Batavia LLC (collectively referred to as the "Corporation"), which collectively comprise the Corporation's consolidated financial statements as of March 31, 2026 and 2025, and the respective change in financial position thereof for the years then ended, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the consolidated financial statements, for the purpose of expressing an opinion on whether the consolidated financial statements are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP").

Certain representations in this letter are described as being limited to matters that are material. Items are considered material, regardless of size, if they involve an omission or misstatement of accounting information such that, in the light of surrounding circumstances, there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the consolidated financial statements.

Except where otherwise stated below, immaterial matters collectively are not considered to be exceptions that require disclosure for the purpose of the following representations, which is not necessarily indicative of amounts that would require adjustment to or disclosure in the financial statements.

Where there was no best estimate but a range of estimated future outflows has been established, we have recognized the minimum amount within the range.
- We have disclosed to you all significant estimates and material concentrations known to management that are required to be disclosed in accordance with GASB Statement No. 62 (GASB-62), *Codification of Accounting and Financial Reporting Guidance Contained in Pre-November 30, 1989 FASB and AICPA Pronouncements*. Significant estimates are estimates at the balance sheet date that could change materially within the next year. Concentrations refer to volumes of business, revenues, available sources of supply, or markets or geographic areas for which events could occur that would significantly disrupt normal finances within the next year.
- We have identified and disclosed to you the laws, regulations, and provisions of contracts and grant agreements that could have a direct and material effect on financial statement amounts, including legal and contractual provisions for reporting specific activities in separate funds.
- There are no:
 - Violations or possible violations of laws or regulations, or provisions of contracts or grant agreements whose effects should be considered for disclosure in the financial statements or as a basis for recording a loss contingency, including applicable budget laws and regulations.
 - Unasserted claims or assessments that our lawyer has advised are probable of assertion and must be disclosed in accordance with GASB-62.
 - Other liabilities or gain or loss contingencies that are required to be accrued or disclosed by GASB-62
 - Continuing disclosure consent decree agreements or filings with the Securities and Exchange Commission and we have filed updates on a timely basis in accordance with the agreements (Rule 240, 15c2-12).
- The Corporation has satisfactory title to all owned assets, and there are no liens or encumbrances on such assets nor has any asset or future revenue been pledged as collateral, except as disclosed to you.
- We have complied with all aspects of grant agreements and other contractual agreements that would have a material effect on the financial statements in the event of noncompliance.

Required Supplementary Information

With respect to the required supplementary information accompanying the financial statements, including Management's Discussion and Analysis:

- We acknowledge our responsibility for the presentation of the required supplementary information in accordance with U.S. GAAP.
- We believe the required supplementary information, including its form and content, is measured and fairly presented in accordance with U.S. GAAP.

- The methods of measurement or presentation have not changed from those used in the prior period and the basis for our assumptions and interpretations, underlying those measurements or presentations, are reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances.

Supplementary Information in Relation to the Financial Statement as a Whole

- We acknowledge our responsibility to present the supplementary information with the audited consolidated financial statements or, if the supplementary information will not be presented with the audited consolidated financial statements, to make the audited consolidated financial statements readily available to the intended users of the supplementary information no later than the date of issuance by the entity of the supplementary information and the auditor's report thereon.

Other Specific Representations

- The Corporation has not completed the process of evaluating the impact that will result from adopting GASB Statement No. 103, *Financial Reporting Model Improvements*; and No. 104, *Disclosure of Certain Capital Assets*, effective for the year ending March 31, 2027, and No. 105, *Subsequent Events*, effective for the year ending March 31, 2028. The Corporation is, therefore, unable to disclose the impact that adopting GASB Statements No. 103, 104, and 105 will have on its financial position and results of operations when such statements are adopted.
- We have provided all lease agreements and subscription-based information technology arrangements, as applicable.
- The Corporation has elected to present the consolidated financial statements under Governmental Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") reporting framework.
- Management has evaluated subsequent events through June 17, 2026, which is the date the consolidated financial statements are available for issuance, and have determined there are no subsequent events, that require disclosure under generally accepted accounting principles.
- During the year ended March 31, 2026, the Corporation did not have any pass-through grants. During the year ended March 31, 2025, the Corporation coordinated a reimbursable pass-through grant agreement with the New York State Office of Community Renewal. The Corporation passed-

through \$143,515 and \$77,600 to Batavia Players, Inc. and Neppalli Holdings, LLC, which were reported as non-operating revenues and expenses.

- During the year ended March 31, 2026, the Corporation corrected a prior year error. As a result, net position was restated as of April 1, 2025 and April 1, 2024 by \$(10,970) and \$(5,497), respectively.
- We have received and approved the adjusting journal entries that were proposed by you for recording in our books and recorded and reflected in the financial statements. The proposed adjusting journal entries are described in Exhibit I.
- In addition to the audit services, based on information in the Corporation's trial balance, Drescher & Malecki LLP has assisted the Corporation in preparing the Corporation's consolidated financial statements for the years ended March 31, 2026 and 2025. With respect to all nonattest services provided, the Corporation has performed the following:
 - Made all management decisions and performed all management functions.
 - Assigned a competent individual to oversee the services.
 - Evaluated the adequacy of the services performed.
 - Evaluated and accepted responsibility for the results of the services performed.
 - Established and maintained internal controls, including a process to monitor the system of internal control.
